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Hebrew Word of the Month



Batach Trust

Hebrew Word for Trust: "Batach"

Several Hebrew words are translated as "trust" in the Old Testament. One in particular, batach, stands out regarding what it looks like to trust in Yah when viewed in its pictographic form.

Hebrew Is Rooted in Pictographs Before we begin, it is valuable to understand that the Hebrew language has its roots in pictographs. In its most ancient form, the letters were once expressed by images representing illustrative concepts. Pictographs, therefore, help us comprehend the foundational substance of the words that contain them. In modern biblical studies, these images can help us unlock the deeper meaning of the text. These pictographic roots connect us to the ancients who came before us. When the concepts behind words are stable, we can be assured that what we think a word means is the same as what it meant thousands of years ago. When language is not attached to concrete ideas, it can become fluid. Word associations and their meanings can change dramatically over time without this type of system in place.

Languages with pictographic roots, according to those who study them, are understood to be more geared toward function and purpose as it applies to life. This difference in thought might help explain why Westerners struggle with trusting Yah's Word; (cont. pg 2)

we have separate compartments for knowledge and functional application. We can read text and be entirely disconnected from how it translates into purposeful action.

May we, like the ancients of old, be interested not only in learning something new, like the Athenians (Acts 17:21), but may we desire to more deeply understand Yah's truth so that we may better live out these beautiful revelations.

Gesenius' Hebrew-Chaldee Lexicon to the Old Testament defines the word "trust" in this way: "to set one's hope and confidence upon" and "to be secure fearing nothing." It is also frequently translated as "confidence," "security," and "hope."

Now let us look at the pictograph of each letter that forms the Hebrew word "trust" (batach) and see how it can help reveal the valuable revelation within this word. The Hebrew letters in batach are "bet," "tet," and "chet."

The Hebrew letter "bet" is the first letter of "batach." It is a picture of a tent, home, or family. It speaks of being on the inside, abiding, and resting. When the word "trust" is used in Scripture, the term "in" frequently follows. ... we have trusted [batach] in His holy name. — Psalm 33:21

Being in a home and family are places that can, and ideally should, be associated with safety, security, trust, and rest.

The Hebrew letter "tet" is the second letter of "batach." It is a picture of something wrapped or coiled like a snake, or it can be like a basket in terms of its weave. The wrapping concept relates to a baby's being swaddled and wound tightly in a blanket. It seems to be soothing for babies to be bundled in this way. Biblically, to be unswaddled was likened to abandonment.

As for your nativity, on the day you were born your navel cord was not cut, nor were you washed in water to cleanse you; you were not rubbed with salt nor wrapped in swaddling cloths.

— Ezekiel 16:4

The letter "tet" suggests being wrapped, like a swaddled baby. "Tet" can also represent distinguishing what is good through experience, as the reference to the snake suggests. A snake has a double-forked tongue that it uses to taste and distinguish the atmosphere around it.

"Tet" is also the first letter in the Hebrew word for good: tov. Oh, taste and see that Yah is good; Blessed is the man who trusts in Him!

— Psalm 34:8

Trust has to do with distinguishing that Yah is good. To be wrapped and swaddled in the goodness of His everlasting arms.

The eternal God is your refuge (place of trust), And underneath are the everlasting arms.

Deuteronomy 33:27

The final letter of the word batach is "chet," which is depicted with a fence or a wall. It is attached to the concepts of surrounding, protecting, and embracing. It also suggests the idea of exclusivity. Regarding exclusivity, "chet" is highly connected with concepts of the covenant. Much like "bet," it is only in relationship with the Elohim of all creation through His one and only Son who covenanted on the cross on behalf of us that we can abide and trust in Him. Yeshua secured for us that indescribable gift and privilege. The letter "chet" suggests the protection of a fence.

"Chet" differs in thought from "bet" because it speaks more of boundaries. Our part of trusting Yah as it concerns this letter is for us to stay within the limits of Yah's purpose and plan. Yah is not obligated to protect us when we step outside those fences He has built for our protection. The promise of these protections is for the faithful, believing, and obedient.


The three Hebrew letters that form the word batach convey the ideas of being on the inside, embraced, and protected. Combining these ideas into a unified concept, we can understand this word to mean that trusting Yah is abiding and resting in Him by discerning His goodness and greatness. In so doing, we are protected, embraced, and surrounded by His covenant love compassion and favor.
